BAY HEALTH

A DIVISION OF BAY AGING

Bay Aging leveraged \$5,448 from King & Queen County to deliver \$94,053 in services.

- 67 seniors are living healthier lives in their own homes because volunteers delivered them 10,185 nutritious meals
- 448 people of all ages were able to make more informed decisions and improve their lives by participating in options counseling, insurance counseling, education, and other programs, while 8 other seniors received 1,550 hours of in-home and personal care services including wellness checks, and education about chronic disease care management is helping to keep them out of the hospital longer and saving on health costs




BAY HOUSING

A DIVISION OF BAY AGING

King & Queen County contributed \$3,438 in support of the Housing Choice Voucher Program. Bay Aging delivered \$118,003 in housing services.

- 23 people are living in 7 safe, decent and affordable homes through the Housing Choice Voucher Program
- 10 families are living in homes made healthier and safer through extensive emergency home repair services



OTHER ECONOMIC IMPACTS:

15 Bay Aging employees live in King & Queen County and/or work in the county

Insurance counseling helped 5 seniors save \$8,871 in health care costs



BAY TRANSIT

Bay Aging leveraged \$25,350 from King & Queen County with \$47,079 in state and federal funds to provide \$72,429 in transportation services.

- 3,113 rides
- 50% of total ridership for people going to work
- Residents also used Bay Transit to access health care, education, polling places, retail and other county services

Spotlight on Success

Mr. A. is an 88 year old Army veteran from the Korean War era who lives in his own home with his elderly wife in King and Queen County.

During the Korean War, he was captured and spent three years as a prisoner of war. He is very proud of his military service and can vividly recall his experiences as a prisoner of war and the deprivations he suffered. Mr. A. returned home only at the conclusion of the war and upon the signing of the armistice.

Mr. A. suffers from multiple chronic health issues—Parkinson’s Disease, diabetes, congestive heart failure and progressive dementia related to Parkinson’s. He is legally blind and hard of hearing. In 2016 he was enrolled in the Veteran Directed Care program due to his 100% service connected health condition and continues to live at home because of the care his is receiving.

Mr. A. is primarily wheelchair bound and has considerable difficulty with performing daily care tasks without assistance or supervision. He relies heavily on others to provide for his daily care, nutrition, medication management and transportation to medical appointments. Because Mrs. A. is elderly and frail and there is no family close by, the attendant also takes care of the household, shopping and the laundry.

Mr. A. often says that without the care he receives through the Veterans Directed Care program and Bay Aging that he would require long-term care placement because his wife is no longer able to meet his extensive care needs. This proud veteran and his wife want to live together in their own home for as long as they possibly can. Bay Aging staff is proud that they can make that happen for them for as long as they can live safely at home.
