# Community Impact Report

## Moving Westmoreland County Forward

*Includes data from Colonial Beach*

We believe a healthy community consists of numerous vital conditions—*basic needs for health and safety, good education for all, meaningful work and financial security, humane housing, healthy environment, reliable transportation, community partnerships and social supports people need to thrive.* Bay Aging is proud to contribute to the economic vitality of the communities we serve by partnering with county leaders, community organizations, and local businesses to leverage services for community good.



## BAY HEALTH

A DIVISION OF BAY AGING

Bay Aging leveraged \$12,852 from Westmoreland County and \$4,000 from the town of Colonial Beach to deliver \$580,274 in services.

- 221 seniors are living healthier lives in their own homes because volunteers delivered them 31,101 nutritious meals
- 2,361 people of all ages were able to make more informed decisions and improve their lives through options counseling, education, insurance counseling, and other programs and services
- 137 seniors received 27,513 hours of in-home and personal care services including wellness checks, and education about chronic disease care management is helping to keep them out of the hospital longer and saving on health costs



## BAY HOUSING

A DIVISION OF BAY AGING

Bay Aging delivered \$34,048 in housing services.

- 10 families are living in homes made healthier and safer through emergency home repair and weatherization

### OTHER ECONOMIC IMPACTS:

38 Bay Aging employees live in Westmoreland County and/or work in the county

11 seniors saved \$111,486 in health care costs due to insurance counseling

Bay Aging paid real estate taxes to: county of Westmoreland—\$20,413, town of Montross—\$120 and town of Colonial Beach—\$11,225

Bay Aging paid water and sewer fees to: county of Westmoreland—\$25,040, town of Montross—\$6,364 and town of Colonial Beach—\$32,759

151 volunteers donated 2,379 hours of service, a \$63,638 savings to the county

Established in 1978 as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, Bay Aging is led by a 15 member volunteer tripartite board led by Stanley Clarke and Kathy Vesley is President / CEO.



## BAY TRANSIT

A DIVISION OF BAY AGING

Bay Aging leveraged \$53,850 from Westmoreland County and 42,840 with \$179,567 in state and federal funds to provide \$276,257 in transportation services.

- 13,459 total rides
  - 7,732 throughout Westmoreland County
  - 5,727 in and around Colonial Beach
- 42% of total ridership for people going to work
- Residents also used Bay Transit to access health care, education, polling places, retail and other county services
